Dear Friends,

When churches select scripture readings for worship, many draw from the Revised Common Lectionary, a list of recommended readings that fit the church calendar. I do that, and I always try to include at least a Gos-



pel reading and a reading from Hebrew scripture. The Hebrew scriptures are often called the "Old Testament," but that has an evaluative quality to it. (Which is "better," old or new?)

Our Hebrew scripture readings from now through Easter will always include a reading from the book of Psalms. The Psalms are full of human emotion. There are songs. The Greek word "psalmos" means "the plucking of strings." That could include strings of a harp, and the strings of emotion on our hearts.

There are psalms of praise, thanksgiving, lament, complaint, and supplication. One of the forms of prayer is to express to God what is on our hearts. "Please help me!" is an example of this kind of prayer. So is, "God, we pray that you DRIVE the cancer out of this person!" It doesn't mean that we are going to judge God on God's ability to heal each individual on our time schedule. But it's important to give expression to our emotions.

There are psalms that tell the story of everything going wrong and doom assured, followed by reconciliation and God's salvific intervention. The psalms are honest, full of life, and yet always hopeful.

If you want to read something before coming to church on Sunday mornings, or before participating in the service remotely, you might begin with the reading from Psalms. My sermon will be based on that reading and the Gospel reading for that Sunday. See the selected lectionary readings on the next page.



And the Rest is History...

This month, April 2023 marks the **280th anniversary** of the ordination of Rev. Daniel Emerson as the first settled pastor of our church! It happened on **April 20, 1743,** which is the date used by the church as the anniversary date of our church's beginning.

The church has changed dramatically in its 280-year history in every sense. Physically, our Meetinghouse is the 4th church building to stand on its site. However, there is one artifact in the church that matches the age of the church's beginning: the 280+ years old communion platter used as part of Rev. Daniel Emerson's ordination on display in the Narthex. Given that the church burned down in 1923 with few items surviving that fire, we are fortunate that at the time of the fire, the platter was in the possession of the Lovejoy/Bancroft family.

Mrs. Lulu Bancroft of Pepperell generously gifted the pewter communion platter to the church. Mrs. Bancroft's ancestry traces back to Jonathan Lovejoy who was born in Andover, Massachusetts in 1719. He came to Hollis in 1743, on the day Rev. Emerson was ordained. Jonathan Lovejoy was



one of the earliest families to settle in Hollis and is buried in the Hollis Church Cemetery.

The fourth generation of Jonathan Lovejoy's family left the communion platter to their daughter, Sarah Elizabeth, born in 1847 and who married John Smith. Sarah was the mother of Mrs. Lulu Smith Bancroft. The platter had been in Mrs. Bancroft's family for over 200 years until her donation. Easter Flowering Cross

Your Help Needed!

The Easter Flowering Cross is popular not only with the congregation, but town-wide ... but help is needed to make it possible. Volunteers are needed:

Saturday, Apr. 1 - Set up the empty cross. This work includes digging a hole and lifting the fairly heavy iron cross so strength is needed. Someone with a pickup truck to move the cross from the shed to the front lawn of the church is also needed.

Thursday, Apr. 6 (Maundy Thursday) – Add black cloth and thorn of crowns to cross at dusk (involves being on a ladder and using zip ties to secure the adornments)

Saturday, Apr. 8 – At dusk/after dark, remove the black cloth and thorn of crowns, add silk flowers to the upper portions of the cross (involves being on a ladder.

Saturday, Apr. 15 (or sometime soon after) – Take the cross down and store in shed. Remove silk flowers and store in shed. This work includes filling the hole and lifting the fairly heavy iron cross so strength is needed. Someone with a pickup truck to move the cross from the front lawn of the church to the shed is also needed.
