Dear Friends,

On May 19th, Church Council agreed that it is neither prudent nor faithful to rush back to in-person worship services across the summer, given all that still is unknown about the COVID-19 virus — especially as our Zoom worship services have gone relatively well, and have enabled us to include more people than often otherwise participate! So, we will continue online worship until at least September 6th.

Still, as we head into our third, fourth, and fifth months of pandemic-induced social distancing and isolation, it’s beginning to feel for some of us like a burdensome drag—on our routines, on our spirits, on our ability to heed the advice of the Scriptures to “give thanks to God in all circumstances”¹ and trust that “all things work together for the good of those who love God.”²

At worship on Children’s Sunday (May 17), I shared that during online Church School the previous week, one of the children had shared a conversation he’d had with his mother about the Biblical story of Jonah. He remembered that Jonah wasn’t doing what God wanted. Jonah tried to get out of doing God’s will and was trying to pursue his own agenda. But things got really rough for him and everyone else. In an attempt to escape from the difficult task God had called him to undertake, Jonah was on a ship heading for what he anticipated would be an easier life. But a huge storm kicked up, and Jonah eventually figured out that the only way things were going to calm down was for the crew to toss him overboard into the sea. Jonah was swallowed by a big fish.

But all was not lost, this wise member of our Church School observed: “God gave Jonah some time in isolation in the belly of the whale to sit and reflect on what was really important.

A Message about Summer Worship

At our May meeting, your church Council made the decision to **continue worshipping virtually at least through Labor Day weekend**. We know this will be disappointing, especially for those who feel that meeting in-person makes a big difference to their worship experience. However, Council realized that holding in-person worship in the ways required to maintain safe social distance and other safe-practices would alter the service so much that it would be more disruptive and disconcerting than continuing with our online gatherings (e.g., we'd have keep at least two pews between family groups, staggering on either side, figure out how we enter and exit safely, everyone would need to remain masked, and no singing would be possible, we could not use hymnals or pass communion or offering plates, etc.).

On the up-side: our **Music Minister and choir**



overwhelmingly expressed a desire to **continue singing and providing special music across the summer** — something we don't typically enjoy! This represents a great deal more work for them, because they need to re-

hearse remotely and recordings are (often) made and mixed in advance — so, many thanks in advance for this additional sacrificial effort in order to enhance our worship!

Finally, because we traditionally invite favorite hymns to be sung at the end of each summer service, I invite you to email me (pastor@hollischurch.org) with your favorite hymn(s) — I'll do my best to incorporate them across the summer Sundays (though I won't necessarily be announcing whose favorite hymns will be sung on which Sunday)!

Perhaps the best news of all about our remote worship is that you are able to log on and join your faith community in worship on Sunday mornings, regardless of where you are in the world! ☺ May you enjoy a safe, healthy, and restorative summer!

What God really wanted him to do. I think God is giving us some isolation time to figure out what we're really supposed to be doing, how we should be treating each other and loving God better." Well. Out of the mouths of children! I was so grateful for this reminder from one of our community's youngest members that the Bible still has things to teach us, if we are willing to read and reflect on how the stories speak to us today.

Across the past six weeks in our online worship, we've focused on the Holy Habit of Biblical Teaching. Have you found time to read your Bible at least a few times each week? I hope so—and I hope you've discovered the power it has to help both ground and buoy our spirits to persevere in these difficult days. If not—and if so!—please consider joining one of the two different small groups for discussion and community that I'll be facilitating on Wednesday and Sunday evenings (see p. 7 for more details) to help deepen your awareness and appreciation for Biblical Teaching in navigating unsettled times. As we continue to move forward into these uncertain days of pandemic and recovery, we can find ourselves resonating more deeply with the experience of the Jewish exiles, who felt far from a familiar place, thrust into a situation with no clear timeline, and a wide-open opportunity to learn to trust in God, and work at meaningful relationships in renewed and enhanced ways. This is the way it has always been for God's people!

For many of us, our summer plans and traditions will have been shaken up, possibly altogether scrapped—tossed overboard, if you will. Although this represents a loss in some ways, I also want to claim the promise that God is nonetheless abiding with us, working with this mess to bring about something that will ultimately bless us in ways we can't yet imagine, ways that will enhance and enrich our lives ... if we accept the challenge of paying closer attention to what God really wants from us: listening closely to each other in new ways, going deeper in our faith and in our understanding of God and one another.

As you page through this summer *Chimes*, take note of all the ways God is giving birth to new realities even as we're grieving the loss of old ways of being. Observe: Construction has begun in earnest (p. 5)! Our choir (or subsets) will perform across the summer (p. 3)! Wednesday (10-11am) Zoom Coffee Hour is continuing across the summer! In addition to Sunday worship and Wednesday coffee chats, there will be two opportunities (Sunday and Wednesday evenings) to gather online for spiritual and communal

growth (p. 7)! Check out the exciting plans for "VBS in a Box" (p. 2)!

One final and sincere note: Please reach out to me if you, or someone you know, is in need of pastoral care or assistance. I do not mean, by encouraging us to focus on the wonderful new ways God is motivating and moving us, to minimize the real suffering that many of us are enduring. This is why community is so important—because we belong to one another, we are connected in the one Body of Christ; when one member suffers, the entire body is less well until all are cared for.³

May God continue to be with us and make Her steady presence known; may His love be revealed in all we do with and for the world; and may Their hope abound in us!

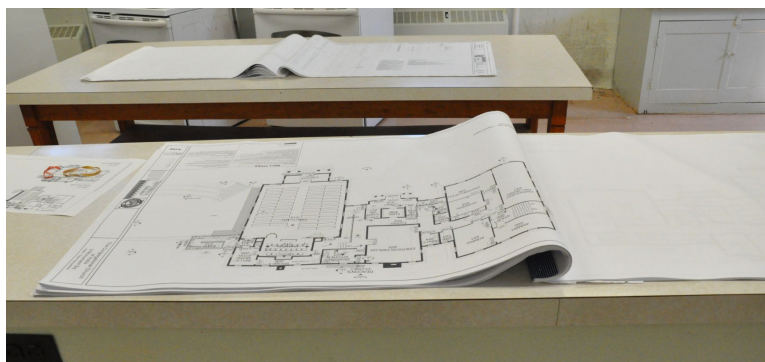
And now, finally--the day is here! **Construction Has Begun!**

On Wednesday, May 20, our construction firm, Milestone Engineering, brought in plumbers, electricians and a demolition team to officially start building our vision. Demolition work began in Hardy Hall and the kitchen and will quickly move to the east side stairway. The patio also got underway with Morin's starting the excavation of the East Lawn! Perhaps you've seen the equipment?

At the end of the demolition period, Milestone will start work on the center portion of the church, enveloping the elevators, rotating the stairs, adding an ADA bathroom, and renovating the Deacon's kitchen amongst many other projects. They expect this work to take approximately three months. The hallway will be blocked off on either side of the elevators by plastic sheeting to block entry to the work zone. Passage through Emerson Chapel to the Meetinghouse from the Administrative area will remain open.

While this is certainly exciting and it is tempting to peek, we respectfully ask that you please refrain from entering the church unless absolutely necessary, as we need to limit the exposure of the construction team to COVID-19. Don't worry though; BOV is hard at work on plans to potentially bring you a virtual walk through on the progress.

Milestone Engineering's schedule calls for construction to last six months and be substantially complete in mid-November. As of today (in May), we hope to be able to occupy the church and resume services sometime in late September, and wrap things up in late November. Watch the church website and Facebook for updates over the summer.



May 20, 2020 - Work has officially started for the BOV renovations! For members of our church Facebook group, progress photos will be added regularly (at least weekly) so stay posted!
