"Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty." (John 6:35)

Dear Friends,

Are you hungry? I'm not just asking whether your stomach is grumbling.

When Jesus was in the wilderness by himself for forty days, Luke tells us that "He ate nothing at all during those days and ... he was famished. The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread.' Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone.'" (Luke 4:2b-4)

Most of us have experienced that gnawing feeling of hunger, but nothing edible seems to satisfy. More often than we probably realize, our spiritual hunger gets mistaken for a hankering for something sweet or savory to put in our mouth; it's part of our human condition—as evidenced by the devil's temptation and Jesus' response.

Each year, the season of Lent offers us an opportunity to pay closer attention to our spiritual hunger, to intentionally focus on our hunger for the "Bread of Life." This year, our Lenten liturgy is going to help us reflect on what these words mean in terms of our spiritual journey. We'll start with a service on Ash Wednesday at 7 p.m., and our sister congregations from Brookline and Mason will join us here in Hollis.

Along the six-and-a-half week way, we'll think about spiritual "bread" for growth, and daily living, for sustaining community, and "bread for the road" as we journey with Jesus toward the cross.

On Thursday evenings, we warmly invite you all to participate in Loaves & Lessons, where this year we will go back to some of our spiritual basics, as we look at Marcus Borg's *Embracing an Adult Faith:* What it Means to Be Christian.

Each Thursday evening, from 5:30-6:45 p.m. on March 13th through April 10th, we'll gather in Hardy Hall to enjoy a simple, delicious meal and then share edifying conversation about our personal experiences and understandings about the following basic themes (by week): God (Mar. 13); Jesus (Mar. 20); Salvation (Mar. 27); Practice (Apr. 3); and Community (Apr. 10). The Faith Formation/ Christian Education Board will be providing childcare each week so that parents and Flock children can also be nourished in new ways—so I hope we'll have a really good, intergenerational turnout!

On Maundy Thursday (April 17) this year, we will be breaking with tradition and trying something new. Having welcomed the Mason and Brookline congregations in worship with us in Hollis on Ash Wednesday, we will journey to the Mason Congregational Church for a simple soup and bread supper at 5:30pm followed by a worship service (with a joint choir). Mark your calendars now and please plan to participate!

Blessings on your Lenten journey, dear friends... may your deepest hunger be satisfied!

Introducing the Bylaws Task Force...

... but, first, a bit of history. If you have been part of our church family for a while, you may remember hearing about a Strategic Plan. The 2016 Strategic Planning Task Force report provided a Vision Statement of our church's vibrant future:

The Congregational Church of Hollis:

A Christ-centered community church where all are welcome, and faith flourishes as our words and deeds reflect God's infinite love, hope, and joy.

The Strategic Plan introduced the four pillars of our church — Welcome, Worship, Learn and Serve — the framework for the organization of our church and its mission, and a "roadmap" of seven goals that would allow us to live into this vision. At the very top of the list was Goal #1: Create a Ministry Team model of church leadership. Pursuit of this first goal was put on hold as we addressed critical infrastructure repairs and facility safety concerns. Renovations of our church building were completed in 2022, allowing us to return to Goal #1 and move toward a Ministry Team model.

The Bylaws Task Force, formed in 2024, discussed ideas about how best to move toward a Ministry Team model. Ministry Teams are groups of people who feel called to a common focused ministry activity. Unlike our current system of boards with their set number of members, terms and term limits, Ministry Teams are fluid, more spontaneous, and bring people together united in a common cause as long as there is a need and people who respond.

In order to move us toward the Ministry Team model, it quickly became obvious that we would first need to do a little housecleaning.

Due to a variety of factors, the current bylaws did not adequately depict the structure of some boards, and committee members discovered inconsistencies and inaccuracies that needed to be corrected. It seemed logical to first clean up and simplify the current bylaws as much as possible to provide a clean slate from which to build a new model.

Bylaws Task Force members met with each of our boards for feedback and approval. Articles pertaining to each board were checked for accuracy. Language was streamlined, and consistency was established across boards. Terms of service were amended to respond to a reluctance to long-term commitments. Most boards were updated to offer 1-year renewable terms with a maximum of 6 consecutive years.

The Kitchen Board was created to recognize the importance of the kitchen and its use in the life of the church. Inconsistencies were corrected, and language in the amended interim bylaws now more accurately reflects how the church actually functions.

After working through the board sections in the bylaws, the bylaws team went back and reviewed all the other sections pertaining to officers, the role of the Pastor and Teacher, general business sections, and examined each section for consistency, streamlined, and made adjustments when needed.

Several sections were "suspended." That means we deferred discussion about updating those sections, for example, defining membership. We will take up suspended sections in future meetings, and they remain in force in the interim bylaws. Draft copies of the proposed interim bylaws will be posted on the church website and printed copies available in the literature rack outside the office.

The work of the Bylaws Task Force is not finished! The next step is to gain feedback and answer questions. We will hold information sessions after church on three Sundays, March 16, April 6, and May 4.

We will consider all comments and make further adjustments if needed before calling a special Congregational Meeting on June 1 where we will vote on the amended bylaws that reflect our current structure and operational processes.

Once our interim bylaws are approved, we will have established the springboard from which to build our Ministry Team model. What could that look like? This is a model of how the Ministry Team Model COULD look, evolved from our current structure and combined with elements adopted from sister church models.

It is simpler, and based on our 4 pillars as outlined in our Strategic Plan. In this model, Council oversees the pillars, which in turn incorporate all of the church activities formerly conducted by boards, committees, and ministry teams.

Operations provides the foundation, or support, for the organization. Council consists of representatives from each pillar, the pastor, members of the Operations team, and at-large members. All work of the church aligns under one of the four pillars established in the Strategic Plan. Pillars are capped by a smaller Council, and supported by the strength of our financial and operations infrastructure.

With your feedback and support, the Bylaws Task Force will proceed with the creation of a strong organizational structure for our church that will endure well into the future, enabling us to fulfill our church's vision and mission.
