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Be Transformed



Dear Friends,

October is a month when it's impossible *not* to see change all around us. By the day, the leaves on the trees transform from green to gold, umber, pumpkin, or crimson, before they surrender their tight hold on the branches that have transported their offerings of photosynthetic energy, finally drifting downward to the ground to further nourish the root system as they decompose. And the energy of that decomposition, feeding the tree across the winter months, gives rise to new leaves in the springtime: the circle of life story, told by the tree year after year.

Across the past month, we've been working with the theme of metamorphosis and emerging from safe (but constricting) places, with the butterfly as our object lesson. Another life story rooted in renewal, though the stages that frame the metaphor are slightly different. Each and every life is potentially its own story of transformation—and transformation is at the very heart of our Christian story. Resurrection is ultimately about our confidence and conviction that death is not the end, but rather the beginning of a new chapter of life in the eternal scheme of things.

When we begin to see this truth, it changes how we understand the whole of this world and life itself. Death doesn't hold the same terrifying power over us.

Where are you in your own process of transformation? As you look back across the years of your earthly sojourn thus far, can you identify moments when you "shed" a former way of being? Did you notice an energizing liberation, even as you discovered a deepened understanding of your *self*—of the person God has created you to be? Was there discomfort, anxiety, and/or grief in the process? And if so, how did that resolve? Or, maybe you've felt a deep longing to change for quite some time, but the fear of what that might mean or cost has kept you "stuck", like a leaf that just can't let go of the branch it's known forever?

CE Book Read

Small Gods by Terry Pratchett

Terry Pratchett? In the CE recommendations? A deceased fantasy author? (Who got married in a British Congregational Church, though I'm not entirely certain we're affiliated)

Well, yes--- why not. Some of us might have watched and enjoyed the Amazon Prime rendition of "Good Omens", his 1990s collaboration with fellow fantasy author Neil Gaiman, in which we follow angel Aziraphale and demon Crowley inadvertently saving mankind by bungling Armageddon. (A second season, contrary to the first one not following the original novel, was just released)

Terry Pratchett, who passed away in 2015, created the DiscWorld, "a world and a mirror of worlds", as many of his novels open, and he often muses on faith and Christianity in a tongue-in-cheek, allegorical way – but being true to himself, the border between narrator and author, and hence the one between satire and revelation is always rather flexible with him. He's elaborated on faith in "Lords and Ladies", "Witches Abroad" and "Sourcery", along with mentions in many of his other works, but "Small Gods" is arguably ALL about faith and how it and God(s) come to be.

The novel is set in Omnia, so called for the mighty god Om, usually depicted as a bull. This theocracy is currently led by Vorbis, the Head of the Quisition in the capital of Korm, and has (d)evolved so far from its origins of Om talking to shepherds, that Om suddenly finds himself in the body of a turtle instead of the bull he had intended to manifest as. He realizes that he is completely powerless and can't be heard and understood by anybody, while Vorbis, supported by his hierarchy of priests and soldiers, as well as the novice master Nhumrod, goes on sacrificing books and humans and plotting war on the "heathen" country of Ephebe – a Discworld version of a progressive, secular, and philosophical ancient Greece.

Om encounters the eidetic novice Brutha, an idiot savant, who was brought up as a strong believer by his grandmother. While taking care of the compost heap in the monastery gardens, he finds the powerless turtle-shaped Om, who was picked up by an eagle, carried away, and fortuitously dropped on said heap. Brutha turns out to be the only person left on the Discworld able to hear Om.

When Brutha shares his insights with Nhumrod, he is told that it is impossible that he would hear the voice of Om. Instead, what he hears must needs be a demon. Brutha should not feel moved by the spirit, but rather obey his betters and their deeper understanding of Om's word.

His case is brought before Vorbis, who discovers Brutha's unusual eidetic abilities and hence has him accompany him on a "diplomatic" mission to Ephebe, in order to use Brutha's strengths to subjugate Ephebe. Brutha brings Om along, and the two of them develop a mutually beneficial, yet not entirely conflict-free relationship.

What now follows is, to all who are familiar with the history of Christianity and the contents of the bible, a par-force-tour through the origins of faith in general and Christianity in particular, including 40 days in the desert, early ascetic Coptic saints, remorse, destruction, redemption, power, inspiration, salvation, Death, exchanges with God, prayer - as well as a look at the seedy underbelly of church hierarchies, religious wars and the inquisition. In general, as a satire and allegory, "Small Gods" holds a mirror to our faith. The fact that God, not only faith, changes and loses power if those that claim to be speaking FOR him have actually become unable to listen TO him, strikes a chord deep inside me.

Even if that concept is far from you, "Small Gods" is a reassuring book for all who have been told that the spirit that moves us is, in fact, only egotism ---- and a cautionary tale for those who have felt moved to teach others what God was trying to ACTU-ALLY tell them. It is a moving introspection into how faith is created, how god(s) are strengthened by their believers and strengthen those who believe in them. At the same time, as most all of Terry Pratchett's Discworld novels, "Small Gods" is excellent, fiercely intelligent, sarcastic, thought-provoking, tongue-in-cheek entertainment.

As Christians, growth, change, transformation are at the heart of our story. Yet, it's possible to remain stubbornly in a particular stage. Sometimes it happens because of unresolved grief or trauma from earlier years, and we simply won't move out of the places that feel safe and familiar. But Gospel message invites us to see that it is only when we release our grip on the familiar, "safe", fixed ways of being, and dare to trust that divine grace is already at work ahead of us and ready to meet us in whatever "new thing" lies in wait, that we will discover the freedom and salvation our souls are seeking. We'll continue to ponder this core truth in weeks to come, as we continue to "Emerge."

There are a number of wonderful community-building activities happening in October to potentially help us to grow beyond our current spiritual comfort zones—do look over the announcements about them on the surrounding pages. But I want to put in a special plug for the worship service on Oct. 22nd, when Cindy Ryherd will share her faith journey story (I'd like to encourage each of you to consider sharing yours!) . . . right before we bless Cindy and Eric on their onward journey. As many of you already know, they are moving to Dover—and we will miss them terribly! They have been joyful, tireless servants of this community in too many ways to count-effectively acting as unpaid staff at different moments. Please come to thank and honor them, and also offer our heartfelt blessing on them as they move into their unfolding future!
