### **Dear Friends**,

I am writing this letter to you from the shore of Swanzey Lake at the Pilgrim Pines retreat center, where I am participating in the NH Conference UCC's annual Clergy Convocation. Our keynote speaker is the Rev. Mary Luti, who is helping this

group of pastors and chaplains to approach the Communion table with renewed and deepened perspective. I am feeling deeply nourished by the whole thing; such a soul feast!

### I'd love to hear your answers to some of the questions she's asked us to discuss so far:

If we didn't celebrate The Lord's Supper once a month, would you miss it? (Why, or why not?)

What do you consider to be the most important words in the communion service—the words without which it wouldn't really be a communion celebration for you?

If a Martian landed in your sanctuary on a Communion Sunday, how would they know what you're doing there is a meal?

Mary's reflections have renewed and deepened my appreciation for the prophetic act of resistance the Communion Table represents to the ways and forces of this world.

Among other things, it is a rebuke to imperial and despotic leaders; to the overwhelmingly unbalanced and transactional nature of so many human relationships;

to so many forms of injustice we're involuntarily caught up in, simply by being humans living in community. Some days it feels like human beings are taking this realm further and further from God's dream for all creation. Yet at Christ's Table we proclaim, "Now, this is how it's meant to be!"

Rev. Luti shared a powerful excerpt from Daniel Berrigan's book, Love, Love at the End: Parables, Prayers, and Meditations by way of illustration: "When I hear bread breaking, I see something else; it seems almost as though God never meant us to do anything else. So beautiful a sound, the crust breaks up like manna and falls all over everything, and then we eat; bread gets inside humans. Sometime in your life, hope you might see one starved man, the look on his face when the bread finally arrives. Hope you might have baked it or bought it – or even kneaded it yourself. For that look on his face, for your hands meeting his across a piece of bread, you might be willing to lose a lot, or suffer a lot – or die a little, even."



### WORLD **COMMUNION** SUNDAY

On **October 5th**, along with many other churches we will observe **World Communion Sunday.** I will have more to say about the beauty of our sacrament, and telling our Christian story, then! In fact, several events that day will honor not only the holy communion we enjoy with fellow Christians, but with all of creation.

Also on October 5 our annual Blessing of the Animals Service will take place on Little Nichols Field at 12 noon. And then, between 2-4 p.m., you'll be able to enjoy more blessed fruits of the earth and of human hands, at the annual Hollis Apple Festival on our Squires Community Patio and town common (or the Hollis-Brookline Middle School in the event of rain).

Various expressions of holy communing will continue throughout the month. On October 19th, our friends at the Brookline Community Church look forward to welcoming us in joint worship and fellowship there in Brookline at 9 a.m. (please note the time difference!). I will miss being with you all that day, but will be communing with my five Stormo sisters in Colorado. One of them initiated a first-ever "Sisters Weekend" for all six of us and is hosting us from the 16th-19th. Although most of us are now in our 50s, we've never done anything like this before! And, while each of us is quite different in terms of passions, pursuits, and perspectives, we all have similar strength of personality ... so, I'm filled with curiosity and anticipation for what the weekend will hold!

Friends, building on the theme/idea of being change-makers who engage the practices of compassion, collaboration, creativity, and empowerment that were introduced in September,



and as we dive into our October-November Stewardship theme of "Dreaming God's Dream": holy communion is at the heart of it all. I hope as you ponder what Holy Communion – the Lord's Supper – means to and for you, that all of us might "find ways to eat in joy the bread of tears, and eat in tears the bread of joy."

And what's more, we ended up raising \$2 million for the renovation, and we don't carry any debt from that capital campaign. Looking back, it's amazing to see how God used our collective faith to bring this dream to life. What other dreams can our congregation make come true?

### Faith in Action Spotlight – David Gilmour

This month we celebrate David Gilmour, who volunteers at the Nashua Winter Warming Station, a program that provides warmth, safety, and dignity to adults experiencing homelessness during the coldest months. David volunteers at the Winter Warming Station, located in the former Elm Street Middle School cafeteria. Open nightly from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m., the center offers warmth, safety, and dignity to adults experiencing homelessness during the coldest months. Guests are welcomed with snacks, coffee, and a calm environment—complete with old movies and a respectful, substance-free atmosphere."

### **How He Got Involved**

David wanted to serve the homeless. He said it wasn't just enough to give money and work on the periphery. He had a deeper call to serve. He wanted to get to know the individuals, know their names, and rub shoulders. A desire to connect. I reached out to Bobby Bagley and signed up through United Way.

### What he Does

David volunteers during the early evening shift from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m., helping distribute snacks and coffee, welcoming guests, and supporting the two staff members who run the warming center. "I was so nervous when I walked in that first night," David recalls. "I wondered how I was going to relate to these people." But as he settled in behind the refreshment table, offering small talk and quiet hospitality, he realized how peaceful the evening felt. "It was warm, friendly, and respectful. They were waiting for me—and I just tried to be present." The experience left a lasting impression. "It was easy to choose a shift that fit my schedule," David says, "and I'm so glad I did. I look forward to going back. I'll definitely sign up again this year—I love doing it now."

### Why It Matters

"The warming center is a place of respect," David says. "It's not about fixing anyone—it's about showing up." Attendance varies from 10 to 30 guests each night. While other shelters offer overnight stays, this space fills a vital gap. It's a place where adult individuals can come and get a respite from the cold. "It's a year-old program, and it's much needed."

### How You Can Help

If you feel called to serve like David Gilmour, you can sign up for a shift through <u>Volunteer Greater Nashua</u>. No special skills required—just a warm smile and a heart for hospitality. Volunteers are always welcome, and every act of kindness makes a difference.
