



ders that the apostles worked. All the Lord's followers often met together, and they shared everything they had. They would sell their property and possessions and give the money to whoever needed it. Day after day they met together in the temple. They broke bread together in different homes and shared their food happily and freely, while praising God. Everyone liked them, and each day the Lord added to their group others who were being saved."





Dear Friends,

I hope you've had a restorative summer! That you've enjoyed plenty of time to experience sabbath rest. To break bread/eat, play, and share life, thoughts, and laughter with people whose company delights you. To pray and spend intentional time communing with God. And in all of this, to become more aware of God's grace and joy in your life.

In Acts Chapter 2, Luke describes the spirit and activities present in the earliest Christian communities as they formed and grew. Though they certainly suffered challenges, the believers were positive – filled with hope and enthusiasm about the present and the future, because they felt the Spirit with them. Though diverse in many ways, they invested themselves deeply in the identity and practices that bound them together: they were followers of the Jesus Way, Christians practicing behaviors that were counter-cultural but offered immense freedom. They were forming holy habits that shaped their personal lives and changed their wider communities.

The American historian/philosopher Will Durant famously paraphrased an observation from Aristotle's *Nichomachean Ethics*, saying, "We are what we repeatedly do."

New *Journey to Confirmation* **program is underway!**

Beginning in 7th Grade, students will begin the process of being confirmed. This program contains most of the components of Confirmation classes in prior years, but the requirements have been streamlined with the option of completing the program in either 2 or 3 years. 7th Graders will continue their learning by performing Bible lesson skits for Sunday Schoolers and will bake pies for Thanksgiving. 8th and 9th Graders will take part in developing relationships with church mentors, and attend an overnight retreat. All students will attend field trips, complete required lessons, and fulfill service hours helping both in church and the wider community.

The Church team graduated many members from the last few years so we are looking to fill the ranks to keep the team participating in

this community league. Games are Saturday afternoons from December to March at the new Westwood Park YMCA. We hope to have at least one practice during the week. LISTEN UP!

A Bible Study on Acts Chapters 1-6

Mondays 10-11 a.m. (Sept. 16-Oct.21) OR Wednesdays 7-8 p.m. (Sept. 18-Oct. 23) Led by Pat Harris and Rev. Tanya

The program of **Holy Habits** our congregation will be engaging across the coming year finds roots in Luke's description of what happened at the church's earliest formation (Acts 2:42-47; see Rev. Tanya's monthly column). "Today American society is an officially secular, religiously pluralistic, and ethnically diverse one. In many ways, *this is also the world of the Acts of the Apostles*, a world where Christianity was not socially sanctioned nor mandated by the government. Christians were a minority and the church was more of a mission movement than an established social institution. As we negotiate these changes in our social role, Acts will be helpful to us.

"Beyond these factors of cultural change that make Acts particularly timely, Acts is a book that is focused on a dynamic church guided and empowered by the Holy Spirit. In the first chapter of Acts, Jesus instructs his disciples to return to Jerusalem and wait for "the gift from on high," that is the gift and empowerment of the Spirit. In Acts 2, the Spirit comes with wind and flame, empowering the new church to tell the story of God in all the languages of the known world. During the Christendom period, when the Church was an established social institution, many churches did not pay a great deal of attention to the Holy Spirit. It would not be too much of an exaggeration to say that we trusted in our own power and did not always feel the need for God's power or the Holy Spirit.

"In this series of Bible studies, you will be encouraged to listen: listen to the Bible, listen to your own questions and responses, and listen to the honest sharing among participants in your study group. Trusting in the power of the Holy Spirit, we believe that in that mix of biblical text, personal engagement, and honest speaking and listening, God's word may be heard, speaking words of challenge and words of comfort."*





Just for Kids...



Answer: "Keep me as the apple of your eye; hide me in the shadow of your wings." Psalm 17:8, NIV



These healthy chips make a yummy back-to-school snack.

What you need:

- 4 apples, cored and cut into 1/8" rings
- Large bowl
- Spoon
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- Baking sheets (sprayed)

What you do:

- 1. Place apple slices in the bowl. Add cinnamon and sugar. Stir so apples are coated evenly with the mixture.
- 2. Place apple slices on the sprayed baking sheets in a single layer.
- 3. Bake at 200 degrees for two to three hours, until chips are dry but still slightly soft.

Thus, as we share more often from our personal resources, we become more and more defined by our generosity. As we consistently take time to pray, we're increasingly prayerful as a way of being. The more often we give thanks, the more grateful we become through and through. These are truths the early Christians (and so many people of faith after them!) discovered as they devoted themselves to practicing the attitudes and actions that defined Jesus' life. And in so doing, the faithful also experienced the freedom, purpose, and profound connectedness Jesus had with God and the world—sublime!

In the coming year, our community will be exploring and practicing some of the "Holy Habits" described in Acts 2. Habits that Jesus himself modeled. Loosely employing resources that have been quite successful with congregations in the U.K., we'll start by spending eight weeks looking at the habit of Prayer. (an outline of the more specific themes we'll be dealing with each week follows my column) If all goes well, we'll develop our understanding and practice the habit of Worship as we move into the Holiday Season. (After that, we'll look at Fellowship, Biblical Teaching, Gladness and Generosity, and Serving—though not necessarily in that order!) Worship services will be "changed up" a little bit from time to time, and there will be more interactive activities that engage us all in thinking, sharing, and maturing together in faith and habit formation.

I've been working with a small team of people to plan the Holy Habits services and activities. If you think you might be interested in also getting involved somehow, please email me (pastor@hollischurch.org) or give me a call; we'd be thrilled to have you join in the fun!

As your summer draws to a close and the school/program year picks up the pace of things, I hope and pray that the restorative sabbath experiences of summer will propel you forward, and that the holy habits we'll nurture together in the coming year will continue to nourish and sustain us all!




