Dear Friends,

Usually in September, we’re all feeling refreshed after our summer adventures and relaxing, eager to greet each other, catch up with those we’ve missed for a time, and resume our “term-time rhythms”. But obviously, there’s nothing “usual” about this entire year, whatsoever. Life with COVID-19 continues to challenge nearly every aspect of our lives, disrupting us at every level of existence. Although some good and important things are happening amidst the unraveling effects of this pandemic, the suffering is real and undeniable especially for the most vulnerable.

Among the blessings I’ve observed in our church community has been an ability — in spite of the virus — to gather in greater numbers and far more from distant places than usual for summer Sunday worship. Granted, we’re all in tiny boxes and we have to stare at a screen instead of looking into each other’s eyes, and many are starved for the physical contact of others in close proximity. Nonetheless, we are “together” and learning to share in new ways. Some have commented that they’re delighted to be learning names, faces, and personalities that were previously unknown to them, though they’ve all been members of this community for many years. And, with enormous thanks to our Music Minister, Julie Oliver, and our choir, we have had new music every Sunday across the entire summer! Still, I have heard and deeply felt the growing cries of detachment, loneliness, and anguish from some of our members who cannot connect online or “virtually” for whatever reason. One of the greatest challenges for church leaders has been discerning the right balance between tending to the *physical* health and safety, and caring for the *emotional* and *spiritual* health and wellbeing of our communities, and especially of the most vulnerable. At times, it’s seemed like they’re in conflict: human beings are created to be in community with each other, to delight in the communion of God-with-us as our spirits connect as we share space and time together. (“*For where two or three are gathered in my name,*” said Jesus in Matthew 18:20, “*I am there among them.*”)

But the coronavirus doesn’t seem to pay attention to our personal needs or preferences; and because it’s impossible to predict how or whether it will ravage any given individual, it is up to us to act responsibly with this understanding, and establish the value of every life by providing for and protecting the most vulnerable as our guiding impulse. Of course, this is just another way of saying we remain committed to living and acting as Christ Jesus would.

Because we understand these needs and concerns, and in response to the fantastic feedback to the July survey about the issue, the Church Council (with advice from the COVID-concerns Task Force and the Deacons) has decided that **we will continue to hold Zoom/online worship services at 9:30 a.m. through the end of November, at least.** We live in deep hope of holding in-person services in the Meetinghouse during Advent, but we will assess further in October.

Also, **I will lead a size-limited (max. 36), physically distanced (6’ apart except family units), outdoor service at 11 a.m. on the second and fourth Sundays of September and October.** Attendees will need to sign up in advance, bring their own chair, wear a mask, and agree to sit in the pre-configured “pods” (chalked-out spaces) assigned to them. Because singing and loud public speaking has been scientifically proven to be a “super-spreader” by aerosolizing droplets even when masks are utilized, we will not have singing at these services and speakers will be limited. **BUT — we will be together!** We will be able to share prayers and (safely-distanced) fellowship and communion in shared physical space. An all-church email will be sent out with further details; please contact the church promptly if you wish to receive the information by other means.

Finally, having not had a vacation this summer, I will be away for the week of August 31-Sept. 7 (Labor Day). I have thoroughly enjoyed the “Unraveled” summer sermon series, and I’m enormously grateful to Cindy Ryherd and Diane Faller, who have done so much behind-the-scenes orchestration to make our Zoom services run smoothly! On Homecoming Sunday, September 13, we will take up a new Holy Habit: Gladness and Generosity. Although there isn’t regular artwork included with this series, I intend to continue using some of the more creative elements we’ve been able to engage on this virtual platform.

On Sunday, Sept. 6th, an active member of our church community, Bryar Trent, will be preaching and leading the service. I hope you’ll Zoom in and support him as he preaches on Jesus’ timely counsel in Matthew 6:25-34 to set aside worry about tomorrow, and be fully present to the challenges and blessings of today! Please note that we will *not* celebrate communion that day, but instead on the *following* Sunday, Sept. 13th.


The apostle Paul wrote letters to some of his communities expressing the pain he felt at not being able to be with the people he loved and served, the people who supported him and prayed for him, as they all ministered together in Christ’s name. But he also reminded the people to give thanks to God for their countless blessings, and to recognize that God would ultimately transform their sacrifices and suffering to produce further blessing, including abiding hope. His sentiments resonate deeply for me these days: I miss you, and long to be with you all again ... And, I look forward with hope and confidence to the day when we will all be blessed to share the delight of God’s presence in the same (excitingly transformed) space!

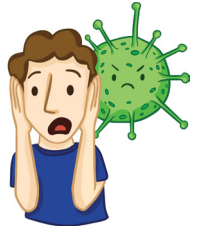
Packed in the Pod

When God Crosses our Paths

Pastor and martyr Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote, "God will be constantly crossing our paths and canceling our plans by sending us people with claims and petitions."

Last spring, the whole world had plans canceled, first by Covid-19 and then by God "sending us people with claims and petitions." Some needed prayers for healing or for coping with grief. Medical staff, teachers, pastors and others serving long hours needed support: meals, check-in calls, "thinking of you" cards. Parents working remotely while helping kids with distance-learning needed encouragement. Crucial nonprofit work still required donations.



Pre-pandemic, you may not have realized that staying home or wearing a face mask could be a ministry. Or that sending a card expresses love in Jesus' name. Or that buying takeout from a local restaurant can be a gift to the owners. **When our calendars empty, God "crosses our paths" in new ways — both to be with us and to nudge us toward others (even if virtually, or 6 feet apart!).**

“Beloved, Love”

“Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God.”
(1 John 4:7)

Our Stewardship theme this year is “Beloved, Love”. God calls us to **Three Great Loves**: Love of **Neighbor**. Love of **Children**. Love of **Creation**. Love becomes trite when we quote it but don’t work for its realization in our lives. As followers of Christ we give ourselves to answering God’s call to love.

Martin Luther King once called love “the most durable power in the world.” As he explained, “Hatred and bitterness can never cure the disease of fear; only love can do that. Hatred paralyzes life; love releases it. Hatred confuses life; love harmonizes it. Hatred darkens life; love illuminates it.”

Pledging & Proportional Giving...

The Biblical instruction to tithe (give 1/10th of one’s income) feels impossible for many people today. 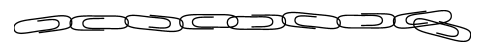
Diapers, Diapers, Diapers!
